## Functional Description

The CY7C436X4 is a monolithic, high-speed, low-power, CMOS Bidirectional Synchronous (clocked) FIFO memory which supports clock frequencies up to 133 MHz and has read access times as fast as 6 ns . Two independent 256/512/1K/4K/ $16 \mathrm{~K} \times 36$ dual-port SRAM FIFOs on board each chip buffer data in opposite directions. FIFO data on Port B can be input and output in 36-bit, 18-bit, or 9-bit formats with a choice of Big or Little Endian configurations.
The CY7C436X4 is a synchronous (clocked) FIFO, meaning each port employs a synchronous interface. All data transfers through a port are gated to the LOW-to-HIGH transition of a port clock by enable signals. The clocks for each port are independent of one another and can be asynchronous or coincident. The enables for each port are arranged to provide a simple bidirectional interface between microprocessors and/or buses with synchronous control.
Communication between each port may bypass the FIFOs via two mailbox registers. The mailbox registers' width matches the selected Port B bus width. Each mailbox register has a flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{MBF}} 1$ and $\overline{\mathrm{MBF}}$ ) to signal when new mail has been stored.
Two kinds of reset are available on the CY7C436X4: Master Reset and Partial Reset. Master Reset initializes the read and write pointers to the first location of the memory array, configures the FIFO for Big or Little Endian byte arrangement and selects serial flag programming, parallel flag programming, or one of the three possible default flag offset settings, 8, 16, or 64. Each FIFO has its own independent Master Reset pin, MRS1 and MRS2.
Partial Reset also sets the read and write pointers to the first location of the memory. Unlike Master Reset, any settings existing prior to Partial Reset (i.e., programming method and partial flag default offsets) are retained. Partial Reset is useful since it permits flushing of the FIFO memory without changing any configuration settings. Each FIFO has its own, independent Partial Reset pin, $\overline{\text { PRS1 }}$ and $\overline{\text { PRS2 }}$.
The CY7C436X4 have two modes of operation: In the CY Standard Mode, the first word written to an empty FIFO is deposited into the memory array. A read operation is required to access that word (along with all other words residing in memory). In the First-Word Fall-Through Mode (FWFT), the first
long-word (36-bit wide) written to an empty FIFO appears automatically on the outputs, no read operation required (nevertheless, accessing subsequent words does necessitate a formal read request). The state of the BE/FWFT pin during FIFO operation determines the mode in use.
Each FIFO has a combined Empty/Output Ready flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{EFA}} /$ ORA and $\overline{\mathrm{EFB}} / \mathrm{ORB}$ ) and a combined Full/Input Ready flag ( $\overline{F F A} / I R A$ and $\overline{F F B} / I R B$ ). The $\overline{E F}$ and $\overline{\text { FF }}$ functions are selected in the CY Standard mode. $\overline{E F}$ indicates whether the memory is full or not. The IR and OR functions are selected in the FirstWord Fall-Through mode. IR indicates whether or not the FIFO has available memory locations. OR shows whether the FIFO has data available for reading or not. It marks the presence of valid data on the outputs.
Each FIFO has a programmable Almost Empty flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}$ and $\overline{\mathrm{AEB}}$ ) and a programmable Almost Full flag ( AFA and $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ ). $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}$ and $\overline{\mathrm{AEB}}$ indicate when a selected number of words written to FIFO memory achieve a predetermined "almost empty state." $\overline{\mathrm{AFA}}$ and $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ indicate when a selected number of words written to the memory achieve a predetermined "almost full state."
IRA, IRB, $\overline{\mathrm{AFA}}$, and $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ are synchronized to the port clock that writes data into its array. ORA, ORB, $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}$, and $\overline{\mathrm{AEB}}$ are synchronized to the port clock that reads data from its array. Programmable offset for $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}, \overline{\mathrm{AEB}}, \overline{\mathrm{AFA}}$, and $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ are loaded in parallel using Port A or in serial via the SD input. Three default offset settings are also provided. The $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}$ and $\overline{\mathrm{AEB}}$ threshold can be set at 8,16 , or 64 locations from the empty boundary and $\overline{\mathrm{AFA}}$ and $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ threshold can be set at 8,16 , or 64 locations from the full boundary. All these choices are made using the FS0 and FS1 inputs during Master Reset.
Two or more devices may be used in parallel to create wider data paths. If at any time the FIFO is not actively performing a function, the chip will automatically power down. During the power-down state, supply current consumption ( $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{CC}}$ ) is at a minimum. Initiating any operation (by activating control inputs) will immediately take the device out of the power-down state.
Retransmit feature is available on these devices.
The CY7C436X4 are characterized for operation from $0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ to $70^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. Input ESD protection is greater than 2001 V , and latchup is prevented by the use of guard rings.

## Signal Description

Master Reset (MRS1, $\overline{\text { MRS2 }}$ )

Each of the two FIFO memories of the CY7C436X4 undergoes a complete reset by taking its associated Master Reset (MRS1, $\overline{\text { MRS2 }}$ ) input LOW for at least four Port A clock (CLKA) and four Port B clock (CLKB) LOW-to-HIGH transitions. The Master Reset inputs can switch asynchronously to the clocks. A Master Reset initializes the internal read and write pointers and forces the Full/Input Ready flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{FFA}} / \mathrm{IRA}, \overline{\mathrm{FFB}} / \mathrm{IRB}$ ) LOW, the Empty/Output Ready flag (EFA/ORA, EFB/ORB) LOW, the Almost Empty flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}, \overline{\mathrm{AEB}}$ ) LOW, and the Almost Full flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{AFA}}, \overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ ) HIGH. A Master Reset also forces the Mailbox flag ( $\overline{\text { MBF1, }} \overline{\text { MBF2 }}$ ) of the parallel mailbox register HIGH. After a Master Reset, the FIFO's Full/Input Ready flag is set HIGH after two clock cycles to begin normal operation. A Master Reset must be performed on the FIFO after power up, before data is written to its memory.
A LOW-to-HIGH transition on a FIFO Master Reset (MRS1, MRS2) input latches the value of the Big Endian (BE) input or determining the order by which bytes are transferred through Port B.
A LOW-to-HIGH transition on a FIFO reset ( $\overline{\text { MRS1 }}, \overline{M R S 2}$ ) input latches the values of the Flag select (FS0, FS1) and Serial Programming Mode ( $\overline{\mathrm{SPM}}$ ) inputs for choosing the Almost Full and Almost Empty offset programming method (see Almost Empty and Almost Full flag offset programming below).

## Partial Reset ( $\overline{\text { PRS1 }}, \overline{\text { PRS2 }})$

Each of the two FIFO memories of the CY7C436X4 undergoes a limited reset by taking its associated Partial Reset (PRS1, PRS2) input LOW for at least four Port A clock (CLKA) and four Port B clock (CLKB) LOW-to-HIGH transitions. The Partial Reset inputs can switch asynchronously to the clocks. A Partial Reset initializes the internal read and write pointers and forces the Full/Input Ready flag (FFA/IRA, FFB/IRB) LOW, the Empty/ Output Ready flag (EFA/ORA, EFB/ORB) LOW, the Almost Empty flag (AEA, AEB) LOW, and the Almost Full flag (AFA, AFB) HIGH. A Partial Reset also forces the Mailbox flag (MBF1, MBF2) of the parallel mailbox register HIGH. After a Partial Reset, the FIFO's Full/Input Ready flag is set HIGH after two clock cycles to begin normal operation.
Whatever flag offsets, programming method (parallel or serial), and timing mode (FWFT or CY Standard mode) are currently selected at the time a Partial Reset is initiated, those settings will remain unchanged upon completion of the reset operation. A Partial Reset may be useful in the case where reprogramming a FIFO following a Master Reset would be inconvenient.

## Big Endian/First-Word Fall-Through (BE/FWFT)

This is a dual-purpose pin. At the time of Master Reset, the BE select function is active, permitting a choice of big or little endian byte arrangement for data written to or read from Port B. This selection determines the order by which bytes (or words) of data are transferred through this port. For the following illustrations, assume that a byte (or word) bus size has been selected for Port B. (Note that when Port B is configured for a long-word size, the Big Endian function has no application and the BE input is a "don't care".)
A HIGH on the BE/FWFT input when the Master Reset ( $\overline{\mathrm{MRS1}}$ and $\overline{\text { MRS2 }}$ ) inputs go from LOW to HIGH will select a Big Endian arrangement. When data is moving in the direction from

Port A to Port B, the most significant byte (word) of the long word written to Port A will be read from Port B first; the least significant byte (word) of the long-word written to Port A will be read from Port $B$ last. When data is moving in the direction from Port B to Port A, the byte (word) written to Port B first will be read from Port A as the most significant byte (word) of the long-word; the byte (word) written to Port B last will be read from Port A as the least significant byte (word) of the long word.
A LOW on the BE/FWFT input when the Master Reset ( $\overline{\mathrm{MRS1}}$ and MRS2) inputs go from LOW to HIGH will select a Little Endian arrangement. When data is moving in the direction from Port A to Port B, the least significant byte (word) of the long-word written to Port A will be read from Port B first; the most significant byte (word) of the long-word written to Port A will be read from Port B last. When data is moving in the direction from Port B to Port A, the byte (word) written to Port B first will be read from Port A as the least significant byte (word) of the long-word; the byte (word) written to Port B last will be read from Port A as the most significant byte (word) of the longword.
After Master Reset, the FWFT select function is active, permitting a choice between two possible timing modes: CY Standard mode or First-Word Fall-Through (FWFT) mode. Once the Master Reset ( $\overline{\mathrm{MRS} 1}, \overline{\mathrm{MRS}}$ ) input is HIGH, a HIGH on the BE/FWFT input at the second LOW-to-HIGH transition of CLKA (for FIFO1) and CLKB (for FIFO2) will select CY Standard mode. This mode uses the Empty Flag function (EFA, EFB ) to indicate whether or not there are any words present in the FIFO memory. It uses the Full Flag function ( $\overline{\mathrm{FFA}}, \overline{\mathrm{FFB}}$ ) to indicate whether or not the FIFO memory has any free space for writing. In CY Standard mode, every word read from the FIFO, including the first, must be requested using a formal read operation.
Once the Master Reset ( $\overline{\mathrm{MRS1}}, \overline{\mathrm{MRS} 2}$ ) input is HIGH, a LOW on the BE/FWFT input during the next LOW-to-HIGH transition of CLKA (for FIFO1) and CLKB (for FIFO2) will select FWFT mode. This mode uses the Output Ready function (ORA, ORB) to indicate whether or not there is valid data at the data outputs ( $\mathrm{A}_{0-35}$ or $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$ ). It also uses the Input Ready function (IRA, IRB) to indicate whether or not the FIFO memory has any free space for writing. In the FWFT mode, the first word written to an empty FIFO goes directly to data outputs, no read request necessary. Subsequent words must be accessed by performing a formal read operation.
Following Master Reset, the level applied to the BE/FWFT input to choose the desired timing mode must remain static throughout the FIFO operation.

## Programming the Almost Empty and Almost Full Flags

Four registers in the CY7C436X4 are used to hold the offset values for the Almost Empty and Almost Full flags. The Port B Almost Empty flag (AEB) offset register is labeled X1 and the Port A Almost Empty flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}})$ offset register is labeled X2. The Port A Almost Full flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{AFA}})$ offset register is labeled Y 1 and the Port B Almost Full flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ ) offset register is labeled Y2. The index of each register name corresponds with preset values during the reset of a FIFO, programmed in parallel using the FIFO's Port A data inputs, or programmed in serial using the Serial Data (SD) input (see Table 1).
To load a FIFO's Almost Empty flag and Almost Full flag offset registers with one of the three preset values listed in Table 1, the Serial Program Mode $(\overline{\mathrm{SPM}})$ and at least one of the flag-
select inputs must be HIGH during the LOW-to-HIGH transition of its Master Reset input ( $\overline{\text { MRS1 }}$ and $\overline{\text { MRS2 }}$ ). For example, to load the preset value of 64 into X 1 and Y1, SPM, FS0 and FS1 must be HIGH when FIFO1 reset (MRS1) returns HIGH. Flagoffset registers associated with FIFO2 are loaded with one of the preset values in the same way with Master Reset (MRS2). When using one of the preset values for the flag offsets, the FIFOs can be reset simultaneously or at different times.
To program the X1, X2, Y1, and Y2 registers from Port A, perform a Master Reset on both FIFOs simultaneously with SPM HIGH and FS0 and FS1 LOW during the LOW-to-HIGH transition of $\overline{M R S 1}$ and $\overline{M R S 2}$. After this reset is complete, the first four writes to FIFO1 do not store data in RAM but load the offset registers in the order Y1, X1, Y2, X2. The Port A data inputs used by the offset registers are $\left(A_{0-7}\right),\left(A_{0-8}\right),\left(A_{0-9}\right)$, ( $A_{0-11}$ ), or $\left(A_{0-13}\right)$, for the CY7C436X4, respectively. The highest numbered input is used as the most significant bit of the binary number in each case. Valid programming values for the registers range from 1 to 252 for the CY7C43624; 1 to 508 for the CY7C43634; 1 to 1012 for the CY7C43644; 1 to 4092 for the CY7C43664; 1 to 16380 for the CY7C43684. After all the offset registers are programmed from Port A, the Port B Full/ Input Ready ( $\overline{\mathrm{FFB}} / \mathrm{IRB}$ ) is set HIGH and both FIFOs begin normal operation.
To program the X1, X2, Y1, and Y2 registers serially, initiate a Master Reset with SPM LOW, FS0/SD LOW, and FS1/SEN HIGH during the LOW-to-HIGH transition of MRS1 and MRS2. After this reset is complete, the X and Y register values are loaded bit-wise through the FSO/SD input on each LOW-toHIGH transition of CLKA that the FS1/SEN input is LOW. Thirty, thirty-six, forty, forty-eight, or fifty-six bit writes are needed to complete the programming for the CY7C436X4, respectively. The four registers are written in the order Y1, X1, Y2, and, finally, X2. The first-bit write stores the most significant bit of the Y 1 register and the last-bit write stores the least significant bit of the X2 register. Each register value can be programmed from 1 to 252 (CY7C43624), 1 to 508 (CY7C43634), 1 to 1020 (CY7C43644), 1 to 4092 (CY7C43664), or 1 to 16380 (CY7C43684).
When the option to program the offset registers serially is chosen, the Port A Full/Input Ready ( $\overline{\mathrm{FFA}} / \mathrm{IRA}$ ) flag remains LOW until all register bits are written. FFA/IRA is set HIGH by the LOW-to-HIGH transition of CLKA after the last bit is loaded to allow normal FIFO1 operation. The Port B Full/Input ready ( $\overline{\mathrm{FFB}} / \mathrm{IRB}$ ) flag also remains LOW throughout the serial programming process, until all register bits are written. $\overline{\mathrm{FFB}} / \mathrm{IRB}$ is set HIGH by the LOW-to-HIGH transition of CLKB after the last bit is loaded to allow normal FIFO2 operation.
$\overline{\text { SPM, }}$, FS0/SD, and FS1/ $\overline{\text { SEN }}$ function the same way in both CY Standard and FWFT modes.

## FIFO Write/Read Operation

The state of the Port A data $\left(\mathrm{A}_{0-35}\right)$ lines is controlled by Port A Chip Select ( $\overline{\mathrm{CSA}})$ and Port A Write/Read Select ( $\mathrm{W} / \overline{\mathrm{RA} \text { ) }}$. The $A_{0-35}$ lines are in the high-impedance state when either $\overline{\mathrm{CSA}}$ or $\mathrm{W} / \overline{\mathrm{RA}}$ is HIGH. The $A_{0-35}$ lines are active outputs when both $\overline{\mathrm{CSA}}$ and W/RA are LOW.
Data is loaded into FIFO1 from the $\mathrm{A}_{0-35}$ inputs on a LOW-toHIGH transition of CLKA when $\overline{\mathrm{CSA}}$ is LOW, W/RA is HIGH, ENA is HIGH, MBA is LOW, and FFA/IRA is HIGH. Data is read from FIFO2 to the $\mathrm{A}_{0-35}$ outputs by a LOW-to-HIGH transition of CLKA when CSA is LOW, W/RA is LOW, ENA is HIGH, MBA is LOW, and EFA/ORA is HIGH (see Table 2). FIFO reads and writes on Port A are independent of any concurrent Port B operation.

The Port B control signals are identical to those of Port A with the exception that the Port B Write/Read select ( $\bar{W} / R B$ ) is the inverse of the Port A Write/Read select (W/RA). The state of the Port B data ( $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$ ) lines is controlled by the Port B Chip Select (CSB) and Port B Write/Read select (W/RB). The $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$ lines are in the high-impedance state when either CSB is HIGH or $\bar{W} / R B$ is LOW. The $B_{0-35}$ lines are active outputs when CSB is LOW and $\bar{W} / R B$ is HIGH.
Data is loaded into FIFO2 from the $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$ inputs on a LOW-toHIGH transition of CLKB when $\overline{\text { CSB }}$ is LOW, $\bar{W} / R B$ is LOW, ENB is HIGH, MBB is LOW, and FFB/IRB is HIGH. Data is read from FIFO1 to the $\mathrm{B}_{0}-35$ outputs by a LOW-to-HIGH transition of CLKB when CSB is LOW, W/RB is HIGH, ENB is HIGH, MBB is LOW, and EFB/ORB is HIGH (see Table 3). FIFO reads and writes on Port B are independent of any concurrent Port A operation.
The set-up and hold time constraints to the port clocks for the port Chip Selects and Write/Read selects are only for enabling write and read operations and are not related to highimpedance control of the data outputs. If a port enable is LOW during a clock cycle, the port's Chip Select and Write/Read select may change states during the set-up and hold time window of the cycle.
When operating the FIFO in FWFT Mode and the Output Ready flag is LOW, the next word written is automatically sent to the FIFO's output register by the LOW-to-HIGH transition of the port clock that sets the Output Ready flag HIGH, data residing in the FIFO's memory array is clocked to the output register only when a read is selected using the port's Chip Select, Write/Read select, Enable, and Mailbox select.
When operating the FIFO in CY Standard mode, regardless of whether the Empty Flag is LOW or HIGH, data residing in the FIFO's memory array is clocked to the output register only when a read is selected using the port's Chip Select, Write/ Read select, Enable, and Mailbox select.

## Synchronized FIFO Flags

Each FIFO is synchronized to its port clock through at least two flip-flop stages. This is done to improve flag-signal reliability by reducing the probability of the metastable events when CLKA and CLKB operate asynchronously to one another. EFA/ ORA, $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}, \overline{\mathrm{FFA}} / \mathrm{RA}$, and $\overline{\mathrm{AFA}}$ are synchronized to CLKA. $\overline{\mathrm{EFB}} / \mathrm{ORB}, \overline{\mathrm{AEB}}, \overline{\mathrm{FFB}} / \mathrm{IRB}$, and $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ are synchronized to CLKB. Table 4 and Table 5 show the relationship of each port flag to FIFO1 and FIFO2.

## Empty/Output Ready Flags ( $\overline{\mathrm{EFA}} / \mathrm{ORA}, \overline{\mathrm{EFB}} / \mathrm{ORB}$ )

These are dual-purpose flags. In the FWFT Mode, the Output Ready (ORA, ORB) function is selected. When the Output Ready flag is HIGH, new data is present in the FIFO output register. When the Output ready flag is LOW, the previous data word is present in the FIFO output register and attempted FIFO reads are ignored.
In the CY Standard mode, the Empty Flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{EFA}}, \overline{\mathrm{EFB}}$ ) function is selected. When the Empty Flag is HIGH, data is available in the FIFO's RAM memory for reading to the output register. When Empty Flag is LOW, the previous data word is present in the FIFO output register and attempted FIFO reads are ignored.
The Empty/Output Ready flag of a FIFO is synchronized to the port clock that reads data from its array. For both the FWFT and CY Standard modes, the FIFO read pointer is incremented each time a new word is clocked to its output register. The state machine that controls an Output Ready flag monitors a
write pointer and read pointer comparator that indicates when the FIFO SRAM status is empty, empty+1, or empty+2.
In FWFT mode, from the time a word is written to a FIFO, it can be shifted to the FIFO output register in a minimum of three cycles of the Output Ready flag synchronizing clock. Therefore, an Output Ready flag is LOW if a word in memory is the next data to be sent to the FIFO output register and three cycles have not elapsed since the time the word was written. The Output Ready flag of the FIFO remains LOW until the third LOW-to-HIGH transition of the synchronizing clock occurs, simultaneously forcing the Output Ready flag HIGH and shifting the word to the FIFO output register.
In the CY Standard mode, from the time a word is written to a FIFO, the Empty Flag will indicate the presence of data available for reading in a minimum of two cycles of the Empty flag synchronizing clock. Therefore, an Empty flag is LOW if a word in memory is the next data to be sent to the FIFO output register and two cycles have not elapsed since the time the word was written. The Empty Flag of the FIFO remains LOW until the second LOW-to-HIGH transition of the synchronizing clock occurs, forcing the Empty flag HIGH; only then can data be read.

A LOW-to-HIGH transition on an Empty/Output Ready flag synchronizing clock begins the first synchronization cycle of a write if the clock transition occurs at time tSKEW1 or greater after the write. Otherwise, the subsequent clock cycle can be the first synchronization cycle.

## Full/Input Ready Flags ( $\overline{\text { FFA }} / \mathbf{I R A}, \overline{\mathrm{FFB}} / \mathbf{I R B}$ )

This is a dual-purpose flag. In FWFT mode, the Input Ready (IRA and IRB) function is selected. In CY Standard mode, the Full Flag ( $\overline{\mathrm{FFA}}$ and $\overline{\mathrm{FFB}}$ ) function is selected. For both timing modes, when the Full/Input Ready flag is HIGH, a memory location is free in the SRAM to receive new data. No memory locations are free when the Full/Input Ready flag is LOW and attempted writes to the FIFO are ignored.
The Full/Input Ready flag of a FIFO is synchronized to the port clock that writes data to its array. For both FWFT and CY Standard modes, each time a word is written to a FIFO, its write pointer is incremented. The state machine that controls a Full/ Input Ready flag monitors a write pointer and read pointer comparator that indicates when the FIFO SRAM status is full, full-1, or full-2. From the time a word is read from a FIFO, its previous memory location is ready to be written to in a minimum of two cycles of the Full/Input Ready flag synchronizing clock. Therefore, an Full/Input Ready flag is LOW if less than two cycles of the Full/Input Ready flag synchronizing clock have elapsed since the next memory write location has been read. The second LOW-to-HIGH transition on the Full/Input Ready flag synchronizing clock after the read sets the Full/ Input Ready flag HIGH.
A LOW-to-HIGH transition on a Full/Input Ready flag synchronizing clock begins the first synchronization cycle of a read if the clock transition occurs at time tsKEW1 or greater after the read. Otherwise, the subsequent clock cycle can be the first synchronization cycle.

## Almost Empty Flags ( $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}, \overline{\mathrm{AEB}}$ )

The Almost Empty flag of a FIFO is synchronized to the port clock that reads data from its array. The state machine that controls an Almost Empty flag monitors a write pointer and
read pointer comparator that indicates when the FIFO SRAM status is almost empty, almost empty+1, or almost empty+2. The Almost Empty state is defined by the contents of register X 1 for $\overline{\mathrm{AEB}}$ and register X2 for $\overline{\mathrm{AEA}}$. These registers are loaded with preset values during a FIFO reset, programmed from Port A, or programmed serially (see Almost Empty flag and Almost Full flag offset programming above). An Almost Empty flag is LOW when its FIFO contains $X$ or less words and is HIGH when its FIFO contains $(X+1)$ or more words. A data word present in the FIFO output register has been read from memory.
Two LOW-to-HIGH transitions of the Almost Empty flag synchronizing clock are required after a FIFO write for its Almost Empty flag to reflect the new level of fill. Therefore, the Almost Full flag of a FIFO containing ( $\mathrm{X}+1$ ) or more words remains LOW if two cycles of its synchronizing clock have not elapsed since the write that filled the memory to the $(X+1)$ level. An Almost Empty flag is set HIGH by the second LOW-to-HIGH transition of its synchronizing clock after the FIFO write that fills memory to the $(\mathrm{X}+1)$ level. A LOW-to-HIGH transition of an Almost Empty flag synchronizing clock begins the first synchronization cycle if it occurs at time tSKEW2 or greater after the write that fills the FIFO to $(\mathrm{X}+1)$ words. Otherwise, the subsequent synchronizing clock cycle may be the first synchronization cycle.

## Almost Full Flags ( $\overline{\text { AFA }}, \overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$ )

The Almost Full flag of a FIFO is synchronized to the port clock that writes data to its array. The state machine that controls an Almost Full flag monitors a write pointer and read pointer comparator that indicates when the FIFO SRAM status is almost full, almost full-1, or almost full-2. The Almost Full state is defined by the contents of register Y1 for $\overline{\mathrm{AFA}}$ and register Y2 for $\overline{\mathrm{AFB}}$. These registers are loaded with preset values during a FIFO reset, programmed from Port A, or programmed serially (see Almost Empty flag and Almost Full flag offset programming above). An Almost Full flag is LOW when the number of words in its FIFO is greater than or equal to (256-Y), (512-Y), (1024-Y), (4096-Y), or (16384-Y) for the CY7C436X4 respectively. An Almost Full flag is HIGH when the number of words in its FIFO is less than or equal to [256-(Y+1)], [512-(Y+1)], [1024-(Y+1)], [4096-(Y+1)], or [16384-(Y+1)], for the CY7C436X4 respectively. Note that a data word present in the FIFO output register has been read from memory.
Two LOW-to-HIGH transitions of the Almost Full flag synchronizing clock are required after a FIFO read for its Almost Full flag to reflect the new level of fill. Therefore, the Almost Full flag of a FIFO containing [256/512/1024/4096/16384-(Y+1)] or less words remains LOW if two cycles of its synchronizing clock have not elapsed since the read that reduced the number of words in memory to [256/512/1024/4096/16384-(Y+1)]. An Almost Full flag is set HIGH by the second LOW-to-HIGH transition of its synchronizing clock after the FIFO read that reduces the number of words in memory to [256/512/1024/4096/ 16384-(Y+1)]. A LOW-to-HIGH transition of an Almost Full flag synchronizing clock begins the first synchronization cycle if it occurs at time $\mathrm{t}_{\text {SKEW2 }}$ or greater after the read that reduces the number of words in memory to [256/512/1024/4096/ 16384-(Y+1)]. Otherwise, the subsequent synchronizing clock cycle may be the first synchronization cycle.

## Mailbox Registers

Each FIFO has a 36 -bit bypass register to pass command and control information between Port A and Port B without putting it in queue. The Mailbox Select (MBA, MBB) inputs choose between a mail register and a FIFO for a port data transfer operation. The usable width of both the Mail1 and Mail2 registers matches the selected bus size for Port B.
A LOW-to-HIGH transition on CLKA writes $\mathrm{A}_{0-35}$ data to the Mail Register when a Port A write is selected by CSA, W/RA, and ENA with MBA HIGH. If the selected Port A bus size is also 36 bits, then the usable width of the Mail1 Register employs data lines $A_{0-35 \text {. If the selected Port } A \text { bus size is } 18 \text { bits, }}$ then the usable width of the Mail1 Register employs data lines $\mathrm{A}_{0-17}$. (In this case, $\mathrm{A}_{18-35}$ are "don't care" inputs.) If the selected Port A bus size is 9 bits, then the usable width of the Mail1 Register employs data lines $\mathrm{A}_{0-8}$. (In this case, $\mathrm{A}_{9-35}$ are "don't care" inputs.)
A LOW-to-HIGH transition on CLKB writes $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$ data to the Mail2 Register when a Port B write is selected by $\mathrm{CSB}, \overline{\mathrm{W}} / \mathrm{RB}$, and ENB with MBB HIGH. If the selected Port B bus size is also 36 bits, then the usable width of the Mail2 Register employs data lines $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$. If the selected Port B bus size is 18 bits, then the usable width of the Mail2 Register employs data lines $\mathrm{B}_{0-17}$. (In this case, $\mathrm{B}_{18-35}$ are "don't care" inputs.) If the selected Port B bus size is 9 bits, then the usable width of the Mail2 Register employs data lines $\mathrm{B}_{0-8}$. (In this case, $\mathrm{B}_{9-35}$ are "don't care" inputs.)
Writing data to a mail register sets its corresponding flag (MBF1 or MBF2) LOW. Attempted writes to a mail register are ignored while the mail flag is LOW.
When data outputs of a port are active, the data on the bus comes from the FIFO output register when the port Mailbox Select input is LOW and from the mail register when the port Mailbox Select input is HIGH.
The Mail1 Register Flag (MBF1) is set HIGH by a LOW-toHIGH transition on CLKB when a Port B read is selected by CSB, W/RB, and ENB with MBB HIGH. For a 36 -bit bus size, 36 bits of mailbox data are placed on $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$. For an 18 -bit bus size, 18 bits of mailbox data are placed on $\mathrm{B}_{0-17 \text {. (In this case, }}$ $\mathrm{B}_{18-35}$ are indeterminate.) For a 9 -bit bus size, 9 bits of mailbox data are placed on $\mathrm{B}_{0-8}$. (In this case, $\mathrm{B}_{9-35}$ are indeterminate.)
The Mail2 register Flag ( $\overline{\text { MBF2 }}$ ) is set HIGH by a LOW-to-HIGH transition on CLKA when a Port A read is selected by CSA, W/ $\overline{R A}$, and ENA with MBA HIGH.
For a 36 -bit bus size, 36 bits of mailbox data are placed on $\mathrm{A}_{0-35}$. For an 18 -bit bus size, 18 bits of mailbox data are placed on $\mathrm{A}_{0-17}$. (In this case, $\mathrm{A}_{18-35}$ are indeterminate.) For a 9-bit bus size, 9 bits of mailbox data are placed on $\mathrm{A}_{0-8}$. (In this case, $\mathrm{A}_{9-35}$ are indeterminate.)
The data in a mail register remains intact after it is read and changes only when new data is written to the register. The Endian Select feature has no effect on the mailbox data.

## Bus Sizing

The Port B bus can be configured in a 36 -bit long-word, 18 -bit word, or 9-bit byte format for data read from FIFO1 or written to FIFO2. The levels applied to the Port B Bus Size Select (SIZE) and the Bus Match Select (BM) determine the Port B bus size. These levels should be static throughout FIFO operation. Both bus size selections are implemented at the completion of Master Reset, by the time the Full/Input Ready flag is set HIGH.

Two different methods for sequencing data transfer are available for Port B when the bus size selection is either byte-or word-size. They are referred to as Big Endian (most significant byte first) and Little Endian (least significant byte first). The level applied to the Big Endian Select (BE) input during the LOW-to-HIGH transition of MRS1 and MRS2 selects the endian method that will be active during FIFO operation. BE is a don't care input when the bus size selected for Port B is long word. The endian method is implemented at the completion of Master Reset, by the time the Full/Input ready flag is set HIGH.
Only 36 -bit long-word data is written to or read from the two FIFO memories on the CY7C436X4. Bus-matching operations are done after data is read from the FIFO1 RAM and before data is written to the FIFO2 RAM. These bus-matching operations are not available when transferring data via mailbox registers. Furthermore, both the word- and byte-size bus selections limit the width of the data bus that can be used for mail register operations. In this case, only those byte lanes belonging to the selected word- or byte-size bus can carry mailbox data. The remaining data outputs will be indeterminate. The remaining data inputs will be "don't care" inputs. For example, when a word-size bus is selected, then mailbox data can be transmitted only between $\mathrm{A}_{0-17}$ and $\mathrm{B}_{0-17}$. When a byte-size bus is selected, then mailbox data can be transmitted only between $\mathrm{A}_{0-8}$ and $\mathrm{B}_{0-8}$.

## Bus-Matching FIFO1 Reads

Data is read from the FIFO1 RAM in 36-bit long-word increments. If a long-word bus size is implemented, the entire longword immediately shifts to the FIFO1 output register. If byte or word size is implemented on Port B, only the first one or two bytes appear on the selected portion of the FIFO1 output register, with the rest of the long-word stored in auxiliary registers. In this case, subsequent FIFO1 reads output the rest of the long-word to the FIFO1 output register.
When reading data from FIFO1 in the byte or word format, the unused $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$ outputs are indeterminate.

## Bus-Matching FIFO2 Writes

Data is written to the FIFO2 RAM in 36-bit long-word increments. Data written to FIFO2 with a byte or word bus size stores the initial bytes or words in auxiliary registers. The CLKB rising edge that writes the fourth byte or the second word of the long-word to FIFO2 also stores the entire longword in FIFO2 RAM.
When reading data from FIFO2 in byte or word format, the unused $\mathrm{B}_{0-35}$ outputs are LOW.

## Retransmit (RT1, RT2)

The retransmit feature is beneficial when transferring packets of data. It enables the receipt of data to be acknowledged by the receiver and retransmitted if necessary.
The retransmit feature is intended for use when a number of writes equal to or less than the depth of the FIFO have occurred and at least one word has been read since the last reset cycle. A LOW pulse on RT1, RT2 resets the internal read pointer to the first physical location of the FIFO. CLKA and CLKB may be free running but must be disabled during and $t_{\text {RTR }}$ after the retransmit pulse. With every valid read cycle after retransmit, previously accessed data is read and the read pointer is incremented until it is equal to the write pointer. Flags are governed by the relative locations of the read and write pointers and are updated during a retransmit cycle. Data written to the FIFO after activation of RT1, RT2 are transmitted also. The full depth of the FIFO can be repeatedly retransmitted.
