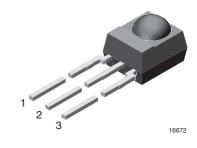
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IR Receiver Modules for Remote Control Systems

Description

The TSOP322.. - series are miniaturized receivers for infrared remote control systems. PIN diode and preamplifier are assembled on lead frame, the epoxy package is designed as IR filter.

The demodulated output signal can directly be decoded by a microprocessor. TSOP322.. is the standard IR remote control receiver series for 3 V supply voltage, supporting all major transmission codes.

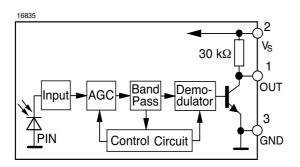

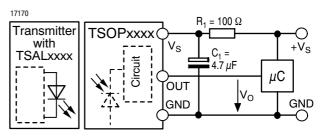

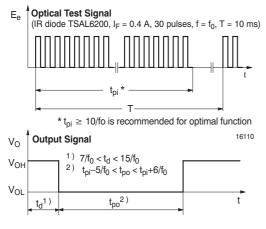


Figure 1. Output Function

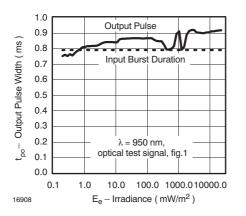
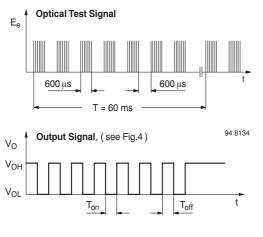


Figure 2. Pulse Length and Sensitivity in Dark Ambient





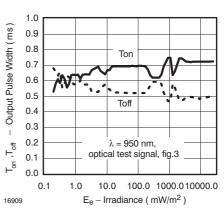


Figure 4. Output Pulse Diagram

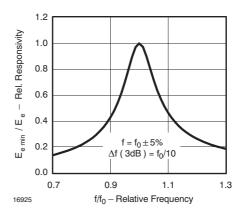


Figure 5. Frequency Dependence of Responsivity

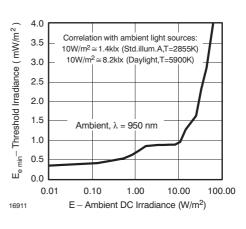


Figure 6. Sensitivity in Bright Ambient

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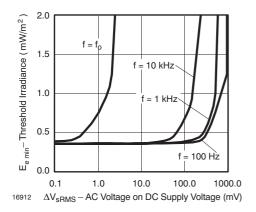


Figure 7. Sensitivity vs. Supply Voltage Disturbances

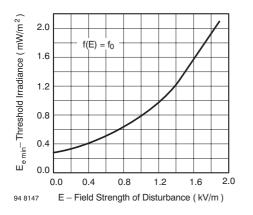


Figure 8. Sensitivity vs. Electric Field Disturbances

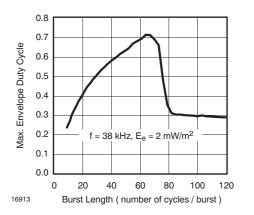


Figure 9. Max. Envelope Duty Cycle vs. Burstlength

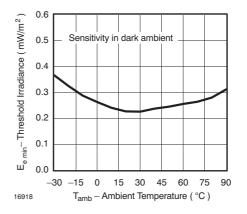


Figure 10. Sensitivity vs. Ambient Temperature

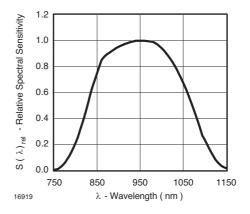


Figure 11. Relative Spectral Sensitivity vs. Wavelength

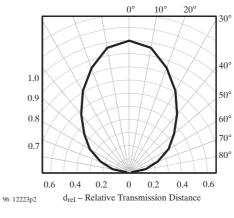


Figure 12. Directivity

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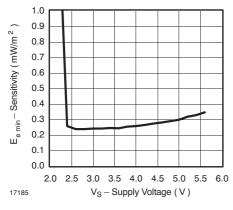


Figure 13. Sensitivity vs. Supply Voltage

Suitable Data Format

The circuit of the TSOP322.. is designed in that way that unexpected output pulses due to noise or disturbance signals are avoided. A bandpass filter, an integrator stage and an automatic gain control are used to suppress such disturbances.

The distinguishing mark between data signal and disturbance signal are carrier frequency, burst length and duty cycle.

The data signal should fulfill the following conditions:

• Carrier frequency should be close to center frequency of the bandpass (e.g. 38 kHz).

• Burst length should be 10 cycles/burst or longer.

• After each burst which is between 10 cycles and 70 cycles a gap time of at least 14 cycles is necessary.

• For each burst which is longer than 1.8 ms a corresponding gap time is necessary at some time in the data stream. This gap time should be at least 4 times longer than the burst.

• Up to 800 short bursts per second can be received continuously.

Some examples for suitable data format are: NEC Code (repetitive pulse), NEC Code (repetitive data), Toshiba Micom Format, Sharp Code, RC5 Code, RC6 Code, R-2000 Code, Sony Code.

When a disturbance signal is applied to the TSOP322.. it can still receive the data signal. However the sensitivity is reduced to that level that no unexpected pulses will occur.

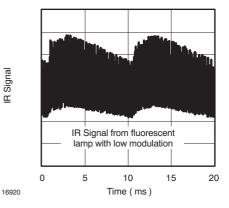
Some examples for such disturbance signals which are suppressed by the TSOP322.. are:

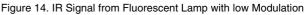
DC light (e.g. from tungsten bulb or sunlight)

• Continuous signal at 38 kHz or at any other frequency

• Signals from fluorescent lamps with electronic ballast with high or low modulation

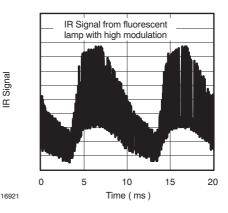
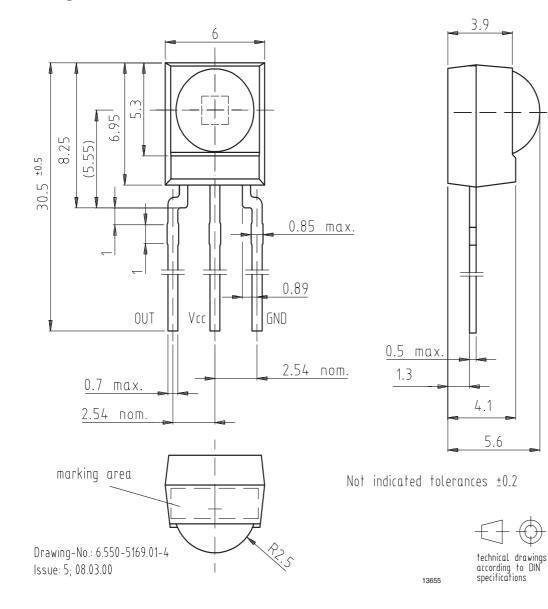


Figure 15. IR Signal from Fluorescent Lamp with high Modulation
